You can learn about how railroads contributed to the growth of Atlanta, the 1996 Olympics held in Atlanta, the state of Georgia's original Native American inhabitants, and more.

Atlanta's Professional Sports Teams

Each one of Atlanta's five (yes, five) professional sports teams really deserves its own category, but we're going lump them all in together here, so you can figure out which ones you want to check out. You've got the Atlanta Braves (Major League Baseball), the Atlanta Hawks (National Basketball Association), the Atlanta Falcons (National Football League), the Atlanta Dream (Women's National Basketball Association), and Atlanta United FC (Major League Soccer). Pick your favorite sport and go cheer for the home team. Bonus points if you also visit the College Football Hall of Fame in downtown Atlanta.

4 Concert Series at Chastain Park

If you love listening to live music under the stars—and how could you not?—be sure to buy tickets to a concert at <u>Cadence Bank Amphitheatre</u> in <u>historic Chastain Park</u>. The outdoor amphitheater, which is considered one of the city's premier concert venues, has been declared Atlanta's oldest outdoor music venue by virtue of its opening date in 1944.

5 Georgia Aquarium

The <u>Georgia Aquarium</u> is one of those attractions that people will definitely ask you about: "Oh, you're going to Atlanta? You are going to the aquarium, right?" The Georgia Aquarium is home to beluga whales, tiger sharks, manta rays, sea lions, whale sharks, and more. Book a <u>Behind the Seas Tour</u> to get a little closer to the animals and learn more about them. And if you're adventurous and want to get really up close and personal with some of those sea creatures, you can book a <u>Shark Cage Dive</u> or <u>a Journey with Gentle Giants</u>.

6 Little 5 Points

Visit <u>Little 5 Points</u> on the east side of Atlanta, about two-and-a-half miles out of downtown. Browse for retro clothing and other treasures at the <u>Junkman's Daughter</u>. Spend some money at Criminal Records, the Pink Zebra boutique, Outback Bikes and other local shops. Grab some coffee at Aurora Coffee or grab drinks at The Vortex Bar & Grill or the Porter Beer Bar. Listen to live music and chow down on a po'boy sandwich at Front Page News, or eat something healthy at Arden's Garden. Now that we think about it, you'll probably need to make multiple trips.

National Center for Civil and Human Rights

A visit to the <u>National Center for Civil and Human Rights</u> is an absolute must during your travel nursing experience in Atlanta. Learn more about the history of the civil rights movement in the United State and find out how it's still relevant to the current day's events. The center, which opened in 2014, also houses papers and artifacts of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.





Things to do

Oakland Cemetery

If the idea of visiting a cemetery for fun seems a little weird to you, this might be your first visit to the south. Atlantans love <u>Oakland Cemetery</u>, and you will, too. Oakland Cemetery is the oldest public park in Atlanta and 48 manicured acres of green space, beautiful gardens, sculptures and artwork. Yes, you can visit the final resting places of some of Atlanta's most famous former residents. After you've wandered around and enjoyed the sights, venture across the street to eat at the well-named <u>Six Feet Under</u> Pub and Fish House.

Ponce City Market

Food halls are popping up all over, and <u>Ponce City Market</u> is Atlanta's biggest and perhaps best-known food hall. An old converted Sears building is home to the trendy food hall. What do you feel like eating? Indian food? Iranian cuisine? Hot chicken? Vietnamese pho? Gourmet doughnuts? It's all there—and more. Be sure to go up and check out the views from The Roof while you're there!

Street Art Tours

Looking for something a little more off-the-beaten-path? Try talking yourself on a tour of <u>Atlanta's Street Art</u>. One favorite: make a trip around the city to see the <u>Atlanta United FC – Spirit of 17 Murals</u>. A great walking tour to try: the <u>Edgewood Avenue Walking Tour</u>, which features dozens of examples of eye-catching street art.

11 The Varsity

California has In-N-Out Burger. Texas has Whataburger. Atlanta has <u>The Varsity</u>. If you haven't had a Varsity hot dog and a frosted orange shake, have you even really been to Atlanta? This local fast food chain got its start in 1928 and quickly became an Atlanta institution. Today the Varsity Downtown bills itself as the World's Largest Drive-In Restaurant, and it's a must-visit, even if you normally gravitate to healthier fare.

12 World of Coca-Cola

The <u>World of Coca-Cola Museum</u> is one of Atlanta's most famous attractions. Here's your chance to learn the history behind this iconic beverage, tour the vault where the famous secret formula is stored—and sample a dizzying array of carbonated soft drinks from around the world in the <u>Taste It! exhibit</u>. (Pro tip: watch out for the soda flavor named Beverly.)


